



From The Desk of Chief Domonic Campbell Monthly Report for Police Department

Date: December 5, 2017

Special Notes

We collected 2.4 pounds of pills this month.

Chief Campbell attended the FBI Command College in Blowing Rock, NC from November 6th – 8th. Topics covered included The Aspects of Leadership, Motivational Leadership, National Academy/Officer Assistance, Media Relations, Neighborhood Gangs & the Laws, Current Trends in the IED World, Civil Unrest, Charleston Church Shooting, and a physical fitness team building challenge.

Our department completed their mandated in service firearms training and qualification this month.

Officer Dakota Hinson has completed 8 weeks of field training.

Sgt. Cirillo has installed a large portion of the computer server equipment in the police department building. New in car cameras have been installed in the Lieutenant's and Sergeant's police vehicles. The remainder of the system cannot be installed or brought online until work on the police department is completed.

Events of interest for the month of November 2017

1. There were nineteen (19) incidents that were investigated this month.

- **November 1st – Breaking and entering motor vehicle and larceny from motor vehicle.** A resident of Whisper Grove Court reported that his car had been broken into. The resident wasn't sure if he had locked his car or not. He found approximately \$200.00 missing from his vehicle and three bottles of prescription medications. Officers took photos and dusted for fingerprints.
- **November 3rd – Possession of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer detected the odor of marijuana when he approached the vehicle. The officer asked the driver if there was anything in the vehicle and she admitted to having the marijuana in between her legs. She removed a chunk of marijuana and a marijuana joint. The officer had the driver step out of the vehicle so he could search the vehicle. The officer also found a pack of cigarillos, an empty pill bottle with marijuana residue, and a jar with marijuana residue in it. These items were photographed and seized for placement into evidence. The driver was unable to produce a driver's license. The officer determined that her license was suspended. The officer also was able to determine that the driver also had two orders for arrest out of Cumberland County for larceny and failure to return rental property. The driver was given a citation for driving while license revoked and unlawfully tinted windows. The driver was then placed under arrest for the possession of marijuana and marijuana charges.
- **November 4th – Violation of Village ordinance (barking dog).** A resident of Dewberry Drive reported a neighbor's dog who barks every morning and for long periods of time. The officer could also hear the dog barking while getting information from the resident. The officer went to the dog owner's residence and explained the Village ordinance. The dog owner was given a warning ticket for the violation since this was the first violation.
- **November 4th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** An employee of the Whispering Pines Country Club reported a dog running around on the property. The employee caught the dog and was holding it until the officer arrived. Before the officer arrived the owner of the dog showed up to pick up her dog. No one at the club knew the dog owner's name but employees described the dog, the dog's collar and the dog's name. They also described the dog owner to the officer. A little later a woman contacted the police department saying she had been trying to pet the dog and the dog scratched her hand with his teeth. It was a very minor wound and the woman wasn't concerned about it she just wanted to know who the dog owner was so she could confirm that the dog had been vaccinated for rabies. A few hours later the officer stopped a vehicle for a traffic violation and the driver matched the description of the dog

owner the officer had obtained earlier. The officer asked her if it was her dog that was loose and found at the Country Club. She stated it was her dog. The officer issued the dog owner a civil penalty as this is the second violation of the ordinance. The dog owner told the officer to have the woman who was scratched to call her and she would provide her with the rabies vaccination information.

- **November 8th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Lakeview Drive found a loose dog in her yard. An officer picked up the dog and placed the dog in the pen at the police department. Animal Control was contacted and they came and scanned the dog for a chip. The dog was chipped and it showed the owner to be a resident of Fairway Lane. The officer attempted to contact the dog owner but got no response so the dog was picked up by Animal Control. A message was left for the dog owner advising where he could claim his dog. Later in the month an officer was able to locate the dog owner and issued him a civil penalty. This is the dog owner's 14th violation (13th civil penalty).
- **November 9th –** An officer was advised by 911 that the Colorado State Patrol was on the line requesting our department to do a welfare check on a young female who lived in Whispering Pines. They have a program in Colorado that allows young people to anonymously report incidents. Someone called the program and said they had a friend in Whispering Pines who was possibly hurting herself. The Colorado State Patrol only had a name but no address. The officer checked the directory and could find only one listing for the last name he was given so he went to the residence. He asked the homeowner if they had a teenage child with that name and he said they did. The officer asked to see the teenager. The officer asked her to show him her arms and some scratches were visible on the arms. The teenager admitting to doing this because she was sad. The officer spoke with the parents and offered them information on resources for dealing with this issue.
- **November 9th – Driving while license revoked – impaired driving revocation and open container violation.** As a result of a traffic stop for speeding the officer asked the driver for his license and registration. The driver admitted to not have a valid driver's license. The officer was able to look it up and determined that the driver's license was revoked for an impaired driving violation. The officer also noticed an open beer bottle on the floor board with spilled beer in the floorboard. The beer was still foamed up and the officer could smell the alcohol. The officer had the driver of the vehicle step out and the officer searched the vehicle. The officer found the open beer bottle on the floor, a grocery bag with a six pack of beer with one bottle missing on the front passenger seat and open beer cans in the front middle console cup holders and in the rear cup holder. The officer took photos of all the beer and then poured out

all of the beer. The driver was issued citations for driving while license revoked for an impaired driving revocation, speeding, and for possessing an open container of alcohol in the passenger area of a vehicle.

- **November 13th – Violation of Village ordinance – dog at large.** A resident of Lakeview Drive reported finding a loose dog and was holding it for the officer to pick up. The officer went to the residence and picked up the dog. The officer transported the dog to the police department and placed the dog in the pen. The officer was familiar with the dog and attempted to contact the dog owner who is a Fairway Lane resident but was unable to contact the dog owner. The following day Animal Control was contacted and they picked up the dog. An officer was able to locate the dog owner later in the month and issued the dog owner a civil penalty for the violation. This is the dog owner's 15th violation (14th civil penalty).
- **November 15th – Possession of an open container.** A report of a suspicious vehicle on Winding Trail was called in. An officer located the parked vehicle. The occupants indicated they were waiting for a female friend who lived farther down the street. They advised that she would walk from the house she was staying at to their vehicle. The officer determined that the driver had a suspended license and a passenger in the vehicle had an open container of beer in the vehicle. The driver was issued a citation for driving while license revoked. After photographing the open beer can, the contents were poured out. The passenger was given a citation for possession of an open container inside a motor vehicle.
- **November 18th – Found property.** A Morning Glory Lane resident requested an officer come to his home. He found some drugs in the room of a female that had been staying at his home. The officer arrived and was shown to the room. There was a grocery bag with syringes, and a makeup bag with syringes, spoons and bundled up aluminum foil. The homeowner indicated that they allowed the female to live with them so she could get her life back on track. The homeowner became suspicious and checked the room she was staying in. The officer collected all of the drug paraphernalia to place into evidence.
- **November 18th – Driving while impaired.** Officers observed a vehicle speeding and also drive into the opposite lane, so the officers pursued the vehicle. The vehicle pulled into a driveway and the driver got out of the vehicle and started walking toward the front door. The officers told the driver to stop but he continued so they approached him and made him stop. The officers could smell the odor of alcohol. While the officers were talking to him he would try to walk away towards the house and each time was told to stay with the officers. An officer began conducting field sobriety tests. The driver had trouble following directions and failed the tests. The driver refused to provide a breath sample. The officer determined that the driver's license was suspended. The

- officer placed him under arrest. The officer found opened containers of alcohol in the vehicle and photographed it for evidence. An officer obtained a search warrant to have blood drawn from the driver. EMS arrived to take a blood sample and provided the sample to the officer. The officer then took the driver inside the Moore County Jail. The driver then decided he would provide a breath sample. His blood alcohol content was .21. Officers issued citations for driving while impaired, driving while license revoked, exceeding posted speed, and failure to maintain lane control.
- **November 20th – Communicating threats.** A resident of Crows Nest reported a female was texting and calling her with threats. The officer obtained a copy of the texts. The officer advised the resident to go to the Magistrate’s Office to swear out a warrant and to let him know when this has been done.
 - **November 21st – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** Officers received a call that there was a loose dog in the Whispering Pines Country Club parking lot. The officer picked up the dog and contacted the owner of the dog who is a South Lakeshore Drive resident. The officer took the dog to the owner and issued her a warning ticket for the ordinance violation as this was the first violation.
 - **November 21st – Assault by pointing a gun and verbal dispute.** An officer received a call from a resident stating he was trying to pick up his child from his ex-wife’s residence on Harmon Drive and was arguing with someone. When officers arrived they saw two vehicles in the driveway facing each other and two men arguing. The officer repeatedly asked one of the men to move out of the yard and pull his vehicle onto the side of the road. The ex-wife came out and said that she asked her ex-husband to leave the property but he would not. They have an agreement that child custody exchanges will be done at the daughter’s school or Harris Teeter. Her ex-husband was supposed to pick up their daughter from school but never showed up so she had to pick up their daughter. Then he later showed up at her residence. She banned her ex-husband from the property in front of the officers. Before officers arrived her boyfriend asked her ex-husband to get off the property and they were arguing. Her ex-husband pulled out a hand gun and pointed it her boyfriend. Officers advised the boyfriend he could go to the Magistrate’s Office to swear out a warrant. Officers finally got the ex-husband to move his vehicle to the road and the daughter was brought out to get into his vehicle. The boyfriend went to the Magistrate’s Office and did obtain an arrest warrant. Officer’s tried to contact the ex-husband but he was not at his Fairway Lane residence. He called the officer later and said he was out of town for the holiday.
 - **November 22nd – Caretaker neglect.** Our department received a DSS report about an elderly Par Drive resident that is being taken care of by an adult daughter. A family member reported that the adult daughter is driving her

mother around while impaired. The resident is currently in the hospital and it has been noted when the adult daughter comes in that her speech is slurred. It was also reported that the adult daughter has a breathalyzer in her car and it is thought she is driving her parent's vehicles in order to bypass having to blow into the machine on her vehicle.

- **November 26th – Flee/elude arrest with motor vehicle, driving while impaired, speeding, and numerous other charges.** As a result of a traffic violation, the officer pulled a vehicle over. The officer approached the vehicle and spoke with the driver and the passenger. He smelled an odor of alcohol. He obtained their names and birth dates as neither one had a license or ID on them. While the officer was running their information from his patrol car he noticed the vehicle started to pull off. The officer followed the vehicle and notified 911 of a chase in progress. Other agencies were notified of the chase and were headed to the location. The driver of the vehicle progressively increased his speed throughout the chase. Two Moore County deputies showed up around the area of Woodlake and took over the lead on the chase. The vehicle turned into a wooded area and the driver jumped out of the vehicle and fled on foot. The deputies chased him into the woods while our officer detained the passenger in the vehicle. The deputies were able to catch the driver and returned him to the area of the vehicle. The driver stated that he ran because he knew he had been drinking and even stated that he drank three beers in the car during the vehicle chase. The officer searched the vehicle and found an open box of beer. The officer arranged for a tow company to seize the vehicle per the flee to elude law. The officer had the female passenger searched by a female deputy and a Percocet pill was retrieved from her person. The officer photographed the pill and seized it for placement into evidence. The driver and passenger were both placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail. The passenger was charged with simple possession of a scheduled II controlled substance. The driver had a blood alcohol content of .12 and was charged with felony flee to elude with a motor vehicle. The driver was also issued citations for the following charges: driving while impaired, speeding in excess of 55, driving left of center, careless and reckless driving, failure to heed to light and siren, failure to carry a valid license, displaying an expired registration plate, possessing an open container of alcohol, and resist, delay and obstruction.
- **November 28th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** Two people walking their dog reported that a loose dog was showing aggression on Brightleaf Drive. The officer found the dog but did not see any signs of aggression. At this time the dog owner was returning home and indicated that the loose dog was hers. The officer issued the dog owner a warning ticket for the violation since this was a first offense.

- **November 29th – Possession of malt beverage by individual under the age of 19.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer first noticed that the vehicle had blue interior lights inside of his vehicle that illuminated the interior of the vehicle. The officer asked the 17 year old driver if there was anything in the vehicle he should know about it. The driver said he only had chewing tobacco. The officer obtained consent to search the vehicle. While searching the vehicle the officer found a backpack under a seat. Inside the backpack was a can of beer. The officer photographed the evidence and then poured out the beer. The driver was issued citations for possession of a malt beverage by an underage person, a plate light violation, and possession of blue lights.
- **November 30th – Identity theft.** A resident of Michael Road reported someone was using his phone number and Verizon account number to make a fraudulent purchase. The officer obtained a copy of the text message from Verizon about the fraudulent purchase.

2. There were eleven (11) arrests this month with a total of 32 charges.
After an arrest, officers are unavailable for at least 2 hours while processing and booking subjects at the Moore County Jail in Carthage. Serving a criminal summons does not require detaining or taking the subject to jail.

- **November 1st** – An arrest was made in connection with the larceny of a watch and firearm from a South Lakeshore Drive residence that occurred on October 23rd. An individual who had been doing some yard work at the home was questioned and the individual finally admitted to taking both items and selling them. He obtained both items back and turned them over to our officer. He was then placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail. He was charged with breaking and/or entering a residence, larceny of a firearm, larceny, possession of a firearm by a felon, possession of stolen firearm, and possession of stolen goods.
- **November 3rd** – As a result of a traffic stop the officer detected the odor of marijuana. The officer search the vehicle and found marijuana, a marijuana joint, a pack of cigarillos, an empty pill bottle with marijuana residue, and a jar with marijuana residue in it. All of these items were seized. After issuing the driver a citation for driving while license suspended and unlawfully tinted windows. The driver was then placed under arrest for possession of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia and for the two orders for arrest out of Cumberland County for failure to appear on a larceny charge and failure to return rental property charge. The officer transported her to the Moore County Jail.
- **November 4th** – As a result of a traffic stop for speeding the officer learned that the driver of the vehicle had an outstanding order for arrest out of Lee County for school attendance law violations. The officer issued the driver a citation for

- speeding and then placed the driver under arrest and transported her to the Moore County Jail.
- **November 6th** – As a result of a traffic stop for not having a license plate attached to the vehicle, the officer determined that a passenger in the vehicle had an active order for arrest out of Harnett County for a misdemeanor probation violation. The officer issued the driver a citation for failing to register his vehicle and an inspection violation. The passenger was then placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.
 - **November 7th** – As a result of a traffic stop for speeding the officer determined that the driver of the vehicle had two active orders for arrest out of Robeson County for driving while license revoked and a criminal summons out of Robeson County for simple worthless check. The officer issued the driver a citation for speeding and for driving while license revoked. The officer then placed the driver under arrest and transported him to the Moore County Jail.
 - **November 10th** – As a result of a traffic stop for an expired registration plate, the officer determined that the driver had an outstanding criminal summons out of Cumberland County for assault on a female. The officer served the summons on the driver after contacting the Cumberland County Magistrate's Office to obtain a court date.
 - **November 15th** – a report was received of solicitors in the area of Lavender Drive and the officer responded and issued warning tickets to the violators. Then the officer received a call of another solicitor in the area of Rothbury Drive. While the officer was on his way to this area he observed a male who was walking who fit the description of the solicitor. The officer stopped and obtained information from this male. He provided the officer with a Michigan ID card. He issued the male a warning ticket for the ordinance violation. When the officer checked the male's information he determined that there was an active order for his arrest out of Orange County, NC for failing to appear on a soliciting charge and a marijuana charge. The officer then placed him under arrest and transported him to the Moore County Jail.
 - **November 18th** – Officers observed a vehicle speeding and crossing the yellow center line and attempted to stop the vehicle. The vehicle eventually stopped in a driveway. The driver attempted to get out of the vehicle and go inside the residence. The officers stopped him and could detect the odor of alcohol. They conducted field sobriety tests and the driver failed all of them. The officers observed open cans of beer inside the vehicle. The driver was driving with a suspended license. The officers placed the driver under arrest and transported him to the Moore County Jail. The driver initially refused to provide a breath sample so the officer obtained a search warrant and had EMS draw a blood sample. Afterwards the driver agreed to provide a breath sample and he had a blood alcohol content of .21.

- **November 25th** – An officer was aware of an outstanding warrant on a Fairway Lane resident and happened to notice lights on at his residence. The officer stopped and found the resident in his yard. The officer advised him of the warrant for assault by pointing a gun that was the result of the November 21st incident. The resident was placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.
- **November 26th** – An officer made two arrests. A driver of a vehicle that fled and led officers on a chase and the passenger for possession of a schedule II drug. See the November 26th incident in the incident section on page 6.

3. There were five (5) traffic accidents in the Village this month.

- **November 6th** – A vehicle pulled into a driveway on Lakeview Drive but the driver left the vehicle in neutral and exited the vehicle. The vehicle rolled down a hill, crossing Lakeview Drive and collided with a vehicle parked in a driveway across the street. There were no injuries as no one was in either vehicles. The vehicle that rolled down the hill had to be towed from the scene.
- **November 7th** – A vehicle was traveling on Airport Road and collided with a deer in the roadway. There were no injuries and the vehicle was able to be driven from the scene.
- **November 15th** – An accident occurred on Par Drive. An EMS vehicle was responding to a call and when pulling into the driveway the vehicle struck the corner of a parked fire truck. There was no damage to the fire truck. The EMS vehicle had damage but was still drivable. No injuries were reported.
- **November 20th** – An accident occurred on Hardee Lane. The driver of the vehicle looked down to adjust his radio and ran off the roadway striking a mail box. There were no injuries reported.
- **November 26th** – An accident occurred on Airport Road. The vehicle was traveling well above the speed limit and ran off the road and struck a fence post, fence, and a couple of trees. A post-crash fire occurred and the entire vehicle burned to the ground. The driver was injured and was transported by EMS.

4. Safety (Department)

- The department continues to provide training to officers.

5. Safety (Village)

- Officers have performed numerous saturation patrols on Whisper Lake Drive, Lakeview Drive, and South Lakeshore Drive in response to traffic complaints about speeders.

6. Other Events of Interest

- **November 6 – 8th** – Chief Campbell attended the FBI’s North Carolina 2017 Command College in Blowing Rock.
- **November 9th** – Lt. Dozier attended the monthly Investigators Meeting that was held at the District Attorney’s Office. Issues of common concern are discussed among local law enforcement law agencies during these meetings.
- **November 22nd** – Chief Campbell attended the retirement of Kris Sheffield, Communication Manager at 911 Communications Center.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Goal #1: To provide a uniform standard that will enable personnel of the department to be more consistent in procedures when handling situations.

Objective #1: Daily briefings are being conducted by officers at shift changes. The Lieutenant and Sergeant have also discussed monthly schedule and operational concerns with all officers this month.

A quarterly staff meeting was held on November 13th. Some of the topics covered included rewriting the department's values, mission, and vision statements, changes to animal ordinance and animal complaint log, status of police department renovations, review of Use of Deadly Force policy and review of Taser policy to name a few.

Objective #2: There were no revised policies this month.

Objective #3: All officers completed policy reviews of General Order 028– Subpoenas, Department Records, Records Retention and Disposition and General Order 029 – Ride Along Program.

Goal #2: To provide for education and further development of department personnel to enhance officer and department professionalism.

Objective #1: This month the officers watched a training video titled Active Shooter Managing the Mass Casualty Threat.

Officer Hinson completed the state mandated in service training courses Improving Decision Making Skills, Positively Impacting Today's Youth, Protecting Victims of Domestic Violence, and 2017 Legal Updates this month.

Officer Strickland completed the state mandated in service training course Positively Impacting Today's Youth and 2017 Legal Update this month.

Lt. Dozier and Lisa Weaver attended the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) training on November 7th at the NC Justice Academy in Salemburg. This training was necessary for when the state reporting system changes next year from UCR to NIBRS.

Sgt. Graham completed the state mandated in service training course 2017 Legal Update on November 9th.

Officer Hinson successfully completed his DCI certification test on November 20th and is certified in General Inquiries for 2 years.

All officers completed their mandated in service firearms training and qualification on November 20th.

Goal #3: Provide for a higher degree of personal contact between community and department personnel.

Objective #1: There were no community events this month.

Objective #2: Officers welcomed 1 new resident this month and provided the new resident with a police "Welcome Packet" describing many of the services offered by our department.

Objective #3: There were no requests for Child IDs this month.

Objective #4: Chief Campbell attended the monthly LEO meeting

Objective #5: There were no requests for child seat installations this month.

Goal #4: Conduct special enforcement programs and participate in GHSP campaigns.

Objective #1: There were no checkpoints conducted this month.

Goal #5: Continue current crime prevention programs to maintain the Village's low crime statistics.

Objective #1: We are fully staffed.

Objective #2: Two traffic complaints were received in September about speeding on Lakeview Drive and South Lakeshore Drive. On Lakeview Drive officers have conducted a total of 10 saturation patrols and issued 1 warning ticket for speeding. The radar trailer was also utilized and the results showed an average speed of 25 mph. The majority of vehicles that were speeding were in the 26 – 30 mph range.

On South Lakeshore Drive officers conducted a total of 12 saturation patrols and issued 1 citation for speeding and 2 warning tickets for speeding. The radar trailer was also utilized and the results showed an average speed of 26 mph. The majority of vehicles that were speeding were in the 26 – 30 mph range.

Officers will continue enforcement efforts on both of these roads.

Objective #3: Officers have conducted:
House checks – 524 (average 17 a day)
Business checks – 873
Store closings – 51

We continue to have 9 residents enrolled in our Senior Call In Program.

Objective #4: There were no requests for articles this month.

Objective #5: Officers have conducted 55 foot patrols at the Food Lion Shopping Center this month.

Objective #6: A traffic study was conducted on South Lakeshore Drive. The results from the radar trailer show that 42% of vehicles were traveling at or below the speed limit. Most speeders were traveling in the 26- 35 mph range. Only 1% of vehicles were traveling more than 10 mph over the speed limit. The average speed was 26 mph.

A traffic study was also conducted on Spearhead Drive. The results from the radar trailer show that 75% of vehicles were traveling at or below the speed limit. Of those vehicles speeding, most were traveling in the 26 - 30 mph range. Out of 5,154 vehicles only 62 vehicles were traveling in the 31 – 35 mph and only 11 vehicles were traveling more than 35 mph.

Objective #7: We now have 4 certified child seat technicians. 3 officers and the Sergeant are certified child seat technicians.

Objective #8: The new server cabinets have been installed in the police department. Equipment is starting to be installed in the cabinets in preparation for our return to the police building.

Goal #6: Proactive approach in looking for safety concerns.

Objective#1: The department continues to provide training to officers.

Objective #2: Officers have performed numerous saturation patrols on Whisper Lake Drive, Lakeview Drive, and South Lakeshore Drive in response to traffic complaints about speeders.

Objective #3: In our efforts to meet OSHA requirements, quarterly and yearly reviews of the Infectious Disease Control Plan have been scheduled. The next quarterly review is scheduled for December 31st.

Goal #7: Seek a new camera system for vehicle and body worn cameras.

Objective #1: The new in-car camera system has arrived. We have begun installing some of the new in-car cameras this month.

Goal #8: Continue to participate in the Village's ongoing recycling program.

Objective #1: The police department continues to participate in the Village recycling program even while temporarily working at Village Hall.
