As of April 1, 2019, glass will no longer be accepted as part of recycling picked up by the Village. The Village encourages residents to continue to recycle glass by taking it to any of the Moore County Solid Waste and Recycling Convenience Centers.

Moore County Public Works' Solid Waste Division has set up glass-only recycling containers at all of their solid waste convenience sites, including the Moore County Landfill site. Residents may take glass to any of the convenience sites and place it in the properly marked glass-only recycling container for it to be recycled.

Glass, for recycling purposes, includes beverage containers and food jars. Ceramic, dishes, drinking glasses, cookware, window pane glass, light bulbs and mirrors are not recyclable. These items should be wrapped and placed in household trash. LED/CFL light bulbs can be recycled at Moore County's Annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event in November or taken to Lowe's Home Improvement store for recycling.

This policy change was prompted by the recycling tipping fee rate increasing from \$25 to \$100 per ton, which took effect December 2018. Effective July 1, 2019, that rate will increase to \$130 per ton. The increase would result in an annual budget increase from \$12,000 to approximately \$62,000. In an effort to keep the weight and our cost of recycling as low as possible, the decision was made to remove glass from recycling. We encourage residents to take the glass to a Moore County Solid Waste and Recycling Convenience Centers instead of putting it in their household trash. The Village pays \$48.07 per ton for landfill fees for household waste and do not want the extra weight of the glass to increase our cost.

Important Village Notifications

One of the most frequent complaints we hear at Village Hall from residents is that they didn't know what is happening in the Village. The Village has several different avenues we use for notifications.

- The Village website provides e-notifications when a new item or information is posted. All you have to do is sign up for e-notifications at <https://www.whisperingpinesnc.net/notify.aspx>.
- Recently, the Village launched an official facebook page for the main purpose of providing residents with information.
- The Village also uses CodeRed (or OnSolve) as a notification system, especially in emergency situations. We have been using CodeRed for several years now and continuously encourage residents to take a few minutes to create a profile and select the method(s) by which you would like to receive the notifications (land line, cell phone, text message, email or by all four).

When CodeRed was utilized to remind residents about the ShamRock 'n' Roll Race being held in the Village, 54% of the calls did not go through and were listed as operator intercepted (call could not be completed due to number disconnected or incorrect number). Since this is our emergency notification system, I once again encourage all residents to create a profile. If you have a profile make sure all your information is up to date.

PLEASE go to <https://public.coderedweb.com/cne/en-US/BF6B8557B45C> (this link is provide under on the Village website Residents tab > Village Information > CodeRed) and update your information so you can be reached in the case of an emergency. Village staff does not maintain the information for this site – you MUST go to the site to enter the info.

Protecting Our Lakes

During recent property transactions, several failing septic systems were identified, some of which were lake front properties. **All** residents are reminded that septic systems should be pumped regularly and inspected routinely.

Homeowners should take steps to protect their septic systems:

- know where septic system in located and do not allow vehicles to drive or park in that area
- limit the use of garbage disposals
- limit the use of chlorine bleach

- use liquid cleaning products / laundry detergents
- large tree roots in close proximity to leach / drain fields should be removed

Whispering Pines experienced above normal rainfall amounts in 2018 which resulted in excess stormwater runoff. Stormwater runoff is considered polluted water which ends up in our lakes and wetlands. It flows from rooftops, over paved areas and bare soils. As it flows, the stormwater collects and transports sediment, pet waste, pesticides, fertilizers, automobile fluids, grass clippings, leaves, pine straw, other yard waste and litter. As residents begin their 'spring cleaning' of yards and homes, take steps to ensure chemicals / fertilizers don't end up in our lakes.

Boating Regulations

Last summer Village staff saw a tremendous increase in the number of complaints, from boaters and lake front residents, regarding excessive wake being created by some boats. Not only did this create a safety issue for smaller or man-powered boats, but it also caused damage to the shoreline and some docks and bulkheads.

At the February Council meeting, the Village Council approved an amendment to Chapter I of the Code of Ordinances, as recommended by the Lakes and Watershed Board (LWB), **to prohibit the use of ballast tanks**. Although Chapter I, Section 6 already stated: *'No watercraft shall be operated at any time so as to in any way endanger or create a nuisance to any persons, other watercraft, shorelines, or other property of any sort'* the LWB and the Village Council agreed that wording expressly prohibiting the use of ballast tanks was needed.

The LWB also updated the Thagard Lake Buoy Placement Map. Boaters should become familiar with the placement of safety and / or no wake buoys.

As boating season quickly approaches, residents are reminded of the regulations in place regarding boat storage in Village access areas:

Non-lake front residents or property owners may store non-trailer, hand launch watercraft in the access areas, at the risk of the owner, provided the following conditions are met:

- (1) A boat rack has been installed by the Village and there is space available on such rack. Spring Valley Lake access areas (68 and 204 Pine Ridge Drive) are limited to canoe and kayak storage only (**any boat left on the ground will be removed by Village staff**)
- (2) the watercraft has been properly permitted with a **Whispering Pines Boat Permit**
- (3) watercraft storage in access areas is **limited to two (2) watercraft per household**
- (4) **all watercraft must be stored upside down or in a manner not to collect standing water**

Are local horses becoming a public nuisance?



A common complaint at Village Hall continues to be that residents do not pick up their 'dog's poop' when walking them in the Village. Now we are adding 'horse poop' to our list of complaints. We are experiencing an increase in the number of complaints regarding horses defecating on Village streets.

Village ordinances define a public nuisance animal as any animal which defecates on any property of anyone other than the animal's owner. The ordinance also states: *'The owner or custodian of any animal shall be responsible for the actions of such animal and further shall be responsible for repairing damage caused by said animal, including cleaning up of animal droppings deposited on walkways or other public lands in the Village.'*

Village residents are encouraged to notify the Whispering Pines Police Department (910-949-9961) immediately if you see horses on Village streets and especially if they are not being cleaned up after. Village staff has attempted to identify the horses / owners on several occasions but have had no luck.

Treehouses/Play Structures

Due to an increase in the number of treehouse / play structures being built within the Village the ordinances regulating these structures were amended, in September 2018, to include maximum size and height requirements and the requirement for the issuance of a WP Accessory Permit prior to construction. Please see Section 4.12 of the Whispering Pines Land Development Ordinance for complete wording.



Resurface Pine Ridge and Piney Point

The Village is continuing its commitment to improve our roads and uses the "Street Condition Priority Report" to set the road improvement schedule. During the month of April the section of road from 128 to 206 Pine Ridge Drive and Piney Point will be resurfaced, weather permitting. If you live in that area of the Village or travel that section of our roads on a regular basis, please know that there will be slow downs. Plan ahead and allow for extra travel time. Pay attention to and follow the instructions/directions given by the road crew.



Spring Valley Lake Spillway Replacement

Pending approval of the project by Village Council at the April 10th Council meeting, the Spring Valley Lake Spillway Replacement Project will be awarded to a contractor mid-April. The drawdown of the lake will begin mid-May. The drawdown should take about 2 weeks; if the weather cooperates.

During the replacement of the spillway, Memorial Causeway will be closed to all traffic.

ATTENTION SPRING VALLEY LAKE RESIDENTS: Initial plans indicate that Spring Valley Lake will need to be drawn down at least 13 feet. Spring Valley lakefront residents will be permitted to store trailered boats in their driveways during the construction period.

The Village is working with Seven Lakes Marine to facilitate boat relocation services immediately prior to the lake drawdown. The boat relocation services has been tentatively planned for a weekday(s) during the week of May 13. If you are interested in this service, please contact Village Hall at 910-949-3141 as soon as possible; but no later than Friday, April 26. The Village will forward the contact information to Seven Lakes Marina who will contact each interested resident to coordinate the relocation of their boat. This service, the cost of which will be the responsibility of the resident, will be between Seven Lakes Marina and the resident. With the anticipation of multiple residents taking advantage of this service, Seven Lakes Marina is prepared to perform this service at a discounted rate. The actual rate will be contingent upon how many residents participate.

WHISPERING PINES LAKE RESIDENT

The Village has set the following tentative schedule for the 2019 spraying of Village lakes in an effort to control aquatic weeds. Spraying will start on Monday, May 20th and it is hoped that all Village lakes and ponds will be sprayed by Friday, May 24th; weather permitting. Spraying cannot be done during windy and/or rainy conditions, and if this occurs, it could push the spraying schedule into the week of Monday, May 27th.

For this spraying cycle, irrigation restrictions are from May 20th to May 29th for the following lakes and ponds: Thagard Lake, Spring Valley Lake (if drawdown has not started), Pine Lake, Shadow Lake, Whisper Lake, Blue Lake, Fly Rod Lake, Cardinal Lake, Cardinal Ponds (middle & lower), Whispering Winds and Hummingbird Ponds. It is important to remember that **ALL IRRIGATION DRAWN FROM A SPRAYED LAKE OR POND MUST STOP FOR A FIVE DAY PERIOD FOLLOWING THE SPRAYING.** While the chemicals used are safe for swimming, fishing, boating or other activities, irrigation with sprayed lake water is very harmful or fatal to lawns and shrubs and vegetable gardens.

The list of lakes sprayed will be updated daily on our Facebook Page and the Village website (<http://whisperingpinesnc.net> on Resident page). You can also call Village Hall at 910-949-3141 x 11 for an updated list every day or with any questions. NCSU recommended that weed control chemicals be applied every four to six weeks for maximum effectiveness. A second spraying will be in June and a third in August. Future spraying dates, once determined, will be posted on the Village website.

Join your family, friends and neighbors for a fun parade and celebration. At Thagard Lake Park there will be games, music, boat rides, refreshing treats provided by Harris Teeter and cold drinks.

We have a short form to fill out that requests information on emergency contacts. We also request a key to your residence in case we need to enter your residence to check on your well-being.

Child Seat Inspections

Our department is 1 of only 4 permanent child seat checking stations in Moore County. Our department currently has 5 certified child seat technicians. Our technicians can assist with the installation of a child seat or inspect your installed child seat to see if it is installed properly. This free service is provided upon request. Officer Dakota Hinson Commended for Assisting Accident Victim Needing CPR



Officer Dakota Hinson was acknowledged at the January 9th Council Meeting by Village Manager Rich Lambdin, for his part in assisting an adult male driver who had a medical emergency while driving that resulted in a vehicle accident. Officer Hinson and members of the Fire/Rescue Department, upon arrival at the scene, assumed responsibility for

CPR and ventilating the patient to allow the paramedics to focus on advanced life support care. The patient was transported to the hospital after receiving quality CPR and advanced life support care at the scene. The patient was subsequently discharged from the hospital and is home progressing with his recovery. Officer Hinson, along with the other first responders, were commended for the outstanding outcome that resulted from the teamwork they displayed in ensuring the best possible care to the patient.

Checking Stations in Whispering Pines

Many ask, what gives you the right to ask for my drivers' license or registration card, or even stop me in the first place?

- In the state of North Carolina, General Statute **20-16.3A** gives police officers the authority to conduct checking stations. The statute has numerous subsections with it, and as a department we follow them strictly. Our police department has a written policy considering checking stations, and we go by a certain operating procedure each time we conduct one.

Well, what is the point in even doing these 'checking stations'?

- The police presence during checking stations helps reduce crime significantly. When the motoring public see that there are numerous police officers in an area, it makes them think twice about committing a crime because they see that the officers are out enforcing the law.
- We make sure every driver has a valid license, registration, and insurance. Isn't it necessary for the motoring public to be up to date with the above three mentioned? As a law-abiding citizen, I am sure you do not want someone who is uninsured, or doesn't even have a valid license, running into the back of your vehicle that is properly insured.
- We also have served numerous outstanding warrants during our checking stations. Which, in return, helps reduce the crime in Whispering Pines when the subjects know that we are out enforcing the law and serving the warrants.

Could our officers conducting checking stations really save The Village money?

- Yes, over the last 10 years The Village has saved a total of **\$67,567.52** through grants from the Governors Highway Safety Program (GHSP). We were able to get **\$101,187.29** worth of equipment, for the price of **\$33,619.77!** We receive the grants because the GHSP believes that checking stations help reduce traffic fatalities and saves lives, therefore they reward us with 'points' that they track. After we accrue so many 'points', you can apply to get equipment. The GHSP will either help The Village pay for some of the equipment, or even pay for the entire bill. Over the last ten years we have received **\$23,620.00** in **free** equipment. Some of the items we have received for free are: IN-CAR CAMERAS, RADARS, TRAFFIC CONES, IN-CAR RPINTER, PORTABLE BREATHER TESTERS AND TRAINING PUT ON BY GHSP.

The main goal of the GHSP is to reduce fatalities in the State of North Carolina. With this program they have set up, officers in Whispering Pines have some

of the best equipment in the county, that saved our residents a lot of money.

Lock Your Car

On the night of Saturday, January 26th/morning of Sunday, January 27th unknown subjects went to 16 residences and entered **unlocked** vehicles parked in driveways and stole miscellaneous items, for the most part coins and cash. No vehicles were damaged or entered by force. The department has collected evidence from the scenes and are asking for assistance from homeowners who may have security cameras in the area. In **all** cases the vehicles were left **unlocked** by the owners. The types of items frequently taken from motor vehicles includes iPods, GPS units, cash, guns, sunglasses, etc.

Vehicle break-ins are very difficult for the police department to prevent. Most occur at night, suspects in most cases are on foot, and suspects can see a police vehicle approaching long before the officer can see the suspect.

Fortunately, in the past Lt. Dozier has been able to solve 75% of these cases, but in most cases the property cannot be recovered.

The simple solution to this issue is to lock your vehicles and remove your valuables from the vehicle. If you have camera systems, please place one where your vehicles are parked. Front doorbell cameras are great, but an additional camera overlooking the driveway would be a plus.

With the assistance of Coldstone Creamery, the officers were able to issue free ice cream coupons to children that were seen wearing their helmets while biking. North Carolina State law requires anyone under the age of 16 years old to wear a helmet while biking. WHISPERING PINES FIRE RESCUE DEPARTMENT

With Spring just around the corner and warmer weather imminent, which typically includes outdoor activities that are intended to be fun and festive, the Whispering Pines Fire Rescue Department (WPFRD) wants you to enjoy a safe summer and offers you a few safety tips to keep in mind.

Grill Safety

It is anticipated that many backyard barbecues will be in use during the summer months. We ask that you use caution and keep safety in mind when setting up, using and cleaning up your grill. According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), 40 percent of house fires and 36 percent of fire related injuries are caused by cooking fires.

- NEVER use a grill indoors including garages, overhangs, and canopies.
- Maintain a 10-foot perimeter from anything combustible – including your house!!!
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area.
- Only use approved ignition fluids – NEVER use gasoline to ignite a grill
- Keep a fire extinguisher, garden hose or bucket of sand nearby to douse a grill fire.
- Inspect your grill before you ignite to ensure everything is in working order, including all connections on your gas grill are tight and not leaking.

Swim Safely

With our many lakes and pools readily available for swimming keeping safety first will help prevent such a fun activity from becoming a tragedy.

- Always swim with a buddy; do not allow anyone to swim alone.
- Always watch your children and never leave them unattended and do not trust a child's life to another child.
- Maintain constant supervision.
- Have young children or inexperienced swimmers wear a U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jackets around water; but, do not rely upon life jackets alone.
- If a child is missing – check the pool first.
- Teach your child how to swim. Visit <http://www.sandshark.org>
- Enroll in Red Cross home pool safety, water safety, first aid and CPR/AED courses to learn how to prevent and respond to emergencies. Visit www.redcross.org
- Use self-closing latches and gates.
- Install a door alarm from the house to the pool area
- Have lifesaving equipment nearby such as life rings or reaching poles.

Outside Fires / Burning

In accordance with Whispering Pines ordinances 'The burning of trash, refuse, shavings, paper, leaves, litter or any other materials of any kind is prohibited.' Weekly yard debris pick is provided to all residents within the Village limits – please utilize the service provided.

Code Of Ordinance

Chapter B - Fire Prevention And Fire Protection
Article IV - Fire Hazards

Section 1 Burning Within Corporate Limits

Section 1.1 Permitted Fires

- a. Fires used solely for outdoor cooking in appropriate devices/grills are permitted. No permit is required.
- b. Fires for human warmth are permitted provided no nuisance is created, the fire is contained in an outdoor fire place, fire pit, or similar device, and is completely extinguished whenever fire is unattended. No permit is required.

Section 1.2 Prohibited Fires

- a. The burning of trash, refuse, shavings, paper, leaves, litter or any other materials of any kind is prohibited.
- b. Fires for the disposal of natural materials generated as a result of a natural disaster such as a hurricane or tornado are prohibited.
- c. Bonfires. No person shall kindle or maintain any bonfire or campfire, or shall knowingly furnish the material for any such fire, or authorize any such fire to be kindled or maintained on or in any street, avenue, road or lane, or public ground, or upon any private lot within the limits of the Village.
