



## **From The Desk of Chief Domonic Campbell Monthly Report for Police Department**

**Date: April 2, 2018**

### **Special Notes**

**We collected 3.5 pounds of pills this month.**

**All police department personnel worked during the ShamRock 'N Roll Race on Saturday, March 10<sup>th</sup>, including the police administrator, our auxillary officer. Officers prepared the Village streets for the race by placing cones at all intersections along the race routes. Approximately 200 cones were placed throughout the Village and the use of police tape and barricades were also utilized to further prevent vehicles from traveling on roads that were part of the race routes. Officers also closed roads and directed traffic during the race to provide a safe environment for all who participated in the race and other activities that took place at the police department. The police administrator and volunteers Lisa Campbell and Curt Weaver, manned a table in front of the police department to distribute literature about traffic safety, identify theft, the Child ID Program, and gun safety. Free gun locks and lollipops were distributed during this event.**

## Events of interest for the month of March 2018

### 1. There were ten (10) incidents that were investigated this month.

- **March 8<sup>th</sup> – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Hardee Lane reported that she was out walking on Pine Crescent with a friend when a dog came running out of a yard. The dog got behind them and was barking and acting aggressively. The dog would not leave until someone called the dog to come home. The officer issued the dog owner, who is a Pine Crescent Drive resident, a warning ticket for the violation since this was the first offense.
- **March 13<sup>th</sup> – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A woman brought a dog to the police department that she found running loose on Niagara Carthage Road at Airport Road. The dog was placed in the pen at the police department. A short time later, a Niagara Carthage Drive resident came by the police department to report his dog missing. He was informed the dog was found. The dog owner was given a warning ticket for this violation since it was the first offense.
- **March 14<sup>th</sup> – Found property.** A public works employee found two packages that had been delivered to the Community Building. An officer collected the packages that were addressed to a couple, that live in West End, but with the Community Building address. A resident of Whispering Pines had held a baby shower at the Community Building and found out that one of the people invited couldn't attend so they mailed the gifts to the Community Center.
- **March 15<sup>th</sup> – Breaking and entering.** A resident of Lakeview Drive reported that he found a basement window open and some damage to the window. He then noticed that the back door had pry marks on it. The resident did not find anything missing from the residence. The window and door were dusted for fingerprints. A week later, an officer became aware of a ring that had been pawned from a previous theft from this same residence back in December. The investigation determined that the person who pawned the ring also broke into the residence both times. The individual was a family member that did not live in the house.
- **March 21<sup>st</sup> - Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Ray's Bridge Road reported that his neighbor's dog had come into his yard again. The officer issued the dog owner a civil penalty as this is this dog owner's 7 violation in the past year.
- **March 22<sup>nd</sup> - Found property.** A purse was turned in that was found on a road by one of the workers for the trash company. The officer looked through the purse to find the identity of the owner and was able to return the purse to the owner who is an Eagle Road resident. All of the contents of the purse were still in the purse.

- **March 24<sup>th</sup> – Damage to property.** The Fire Rescue Department advised they responded to a medical call at a residence on Hardee Lane where a resident was transported by EMS. Another resident of the household was attempting to back out of his garage and struck a Fire Rescue Department vehicle. The resident thought the emergency vehicle had already left. There were no injuries and both vehicles were drivable.
- **March 27<sup>th</sup> – Possession of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop for speeding the officer detected an odor of marijuana coming from inside the vehicle. The officer searched the vehicle and found a backpack containing a marijuana pipe and a bag of marijuana. The officer photographed and seized the items for placement into evidence. The driver was placed under arrest.
- **March 30<sup>th</sup> – Carrying a concealed weapon.** As a result of a traffic stop for speeding the officer determined that the driver had an active order for arrest out of Robeson County and a passenger had an active warrant for arrest out of Randolph County. When the driver was asked to get out of the vehicle he then notified the officer that he had a pistol under the passenger's seat. The officer retrieved the pistol which had 13 rounds in the magazine for placement into evidence. Both the driver and the passenger were arrested and the driver was also charged with carrying a concealed weapon.
- **March 31<sup>st</sup> – Verbal dispute.** A resident of Goldenrod Drive reported that his wife had assaulted him. He said his wife had been drinking and they got into an argument and his wife picked up a plastic gate tried to hit him with it. He was able to block the blow from the gate and had no marks. The wife said she picked up the gate but didn't hit her husband. The husband was advised that he could go see the Magistrate to take out a warrant for assault if he wanted to. The wife decided to stay with a relative for the night. The husband wasn't sure if he would go to see the Magistrate.

**2. There were six (6) arrests this month with a total of 11 charges.**

*After an arrest, officers are unavailable for at least 2 hours while processing and booking subjects at the Moore County Jail in Carthage. Serving a criminal summons does not require detaining or taking the subject to jail.*

- **March 5<sup>th</sup>** – As a result of a traffic stop the officer determined the driver was driving with a revoked license and also had orders for arrest out of Moore County for failure to appear on a probation violation, driving while license revoked, and a probation violation. The officer issued the driver a citation for driving while license revoked. The officer then placed the driver under arrest and transported him to the Moore County Jail.
- **March 14<sup>th</sup>** – As a result of a traffic stop the officer determined that a passenger in the vehicle had an active order for arrest out of Moore County for

unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. The officer issued a citation to the driver for driving while license revoked. The officer then placed the passenger under arrest and transported her to the Moore County Jail.

- **March 27<sup>th</sup>** – As a result of a traffic stop for speeding the officer conducted a search of the vehicle and found a plastic bag with marijuana and a marijuana pipe. The items were seized for placement into evidence. The driver was issued a citation for speeding. The driver was arrested by citation. The officer issued a citation to the driver for possession of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia.
- **March 27<sup>th</sup>** – An officer served a criminal summons on a female who was at our police department being interviewed about a case our department is handling. The criminal summons was out of Southern Pines and was for fraud – obtaining money/property by false pretense.
- **March 30<sup>th</sup>** – As a result of a traffic stop the officer determined that the driver of the vehicle had an order for arrest out of Robeson County for failure to appear on a cruelty to animals charge. After the driver was asked to step out of the vehicle he notified the officer that he had a pistol under the passenger seat. The officer seized the pistol and also charged the driver with carrying a concealed weapon. The driver was placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.
- **March 30<sup>th</sup>** – As a result of a traffic stop the officer determined that a passenger in the vehicle had an active arrest warrant out of Randolph County for cyberstalking. The passenger was placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.

### **3. There were four (4) traffic accidents in the Village this month.**

- **March 1<sup>st</sup>** – An accident occurred on Ray's Bridge Road. A vehicle was stopped at the stop sign and a vehicle that was approaching from behind failed to reduce speed and collided with the rear of the stopped vehicle. The driver of the second vehicle was issued a citation for failure to reduce speed. There were no injuries reported and both vehicles were able to be driven from the scene.
- **March 2<sup>nd</sup>** – An accident occurred on Hwy 22. A vehicle was traveling north on Hwy 22 and a vehicle pulled out from the stop sign on Sullivan Drive to turn left and struck the vehicle traveling on Hwy 22. The driver that pulled out from the stop sign was given a citation for unsafe movement. No injuries were reported and one of the vehicles had to be towed from the scene.
- **March 26<sup>th</sup>** – An accident occurred in the Food Lion parking lot. A vehicle was pulling out of parking space and struck a vehicle that was parked. The driver of the vehicle was issued a citation for an unsafe movement. There were no injuries and both vehicles were able to be driven from the scene.

- **March 28<sup>th</sup>** – a driver attempted to park a vehicle in front of the Subway restaurant and instead of hitting the brake the driver hit the gas pedal. The vehicle jumped the curb and struck the corner of the brick building. The vehicle became lodged between a metal railing and the brick building. The driver of the vehicle sustained a cut to his leg. The vehicle had to be towed from the scene.

#### **4. Safety (Department)**

- The department purchased window breaking tool and seat belt cutter tool for each patrol vehicle.

#### **5. Safety (Village)**

- Officers have conducted numerous saturation patrols.

#### **6. Other Events of Interest**

- **March 6<sup>th</sup>** – Senior Officer Holt attended the monthly NC SafeKids meeting that was held in Pinehurst at the FirstHealth Community Building.
- **March 6<sup>th</sup>** – Sgt. Graham, Senior Officer Holt, and Officer Hinson attended the Math Night event that was held at Food Lion.
- **March 13<sup>th</sup>** – Chief Campbell and Sgt. Graham attended the Chief’s Meeting in Carthage.
- **March 14<sup>th</sup>** – Lt. Dozier attended the monthly Investigators Meeting, that was held at Sandhills Community College, where issues of common concern are discussed among local law enforcement agencies.
- **March 15<sup>th</sup>** - Chief Campbell attended the annual BLET/Criminal Justice Advisory Committee meeting at Sandhills Community College.

## GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

**Goal #1: To provide a uniform standard that will enable personnel of the department to be more consistent in procedures when handling situations.**

Objective #1: Daily briefings are being conducted by officers at shift changes. The Lieutenant and Sergeant have also discussed monthly schedule and operational concerns with all officers this month.

Objective #2: There were no revised policies this month.

Objective #3: All officers completed policy reviews of General Order 036 – Diplomatic Immunity and Consular Notification and General Order 037 – Pharmaceutical Drug Disposal Program.

**Goal #2: To provide for education and further development of department personnel to enhance officer and department professionalism.**

Objective #1: This month the officers watched a training video from Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department which depicts an officer involved shooting after responding to a subject having a mental break down. The video covers the steps that officers need to take after being involved in an armed confrontation.

Officer Hinson completed the TASER training on March 5<sup>th</sup> and is now certified to use a TASER.

Senior Officer Holt completed a NC Justice Academy online class on Officer Safety: Surviving Planned Attacks Against Law Enforcement Officers on March 6<sup>th</sup>.

Lisa Weaver successfully completed her DCI – File Transactions recertification on March 7<sup>th</sup>.

Lt. Dozier completed the mandated in-service training Strategies to Improve Law Enforcement Interactions & Relationships with Minority Youth on March 14<sup>th</sup>, Equality in Policing on March 15<sup>th</sup>, and Communication Skills With Persons in Crisis – De-Escalation Techniques on March 16<sup>th</sup>.

Officer Hinson completed the NC Justice Academy's on-line course 2018 Law Enforcement Intelligence Update on March 15<sup>th</sup> and Surviving Planned Attacks Against Law Enforcement Officers on March 28<sup>th</sup>. He also completed the mandated in-service training course Communication Skills With Person in Crisis – De-Escalation Techniques on March 16<sup>th</sup>.

Senior Officer Holt completed the mandated in-service training courses Equality in Policing and Strategies to Improve Law Enforcement Interactions & Relationships with Minority Youth on March 12<sup>th</sup> and Communication Skills With Persons in Crisis – De-Escalation Techniques on March 20<sup>th</sup>.

Lt. Dozier attended the 3-day NC Association for Property and Evidence Conference on March 19 – 21 in Wilmington.

Sgt. Graham completed the mandated in-service training course Strategies to Improve Law Enforcement Interactions and relationships with Minority Youth on March 21<sup>st</sup>.

Master Officer Tate completed the Equality in Policing mandated in-service training on March 13<sup>th</sup> and Communication Skills With Persons in Crisis – De-Escalation Techniques on March 23<sup>rd</sup>.

All police department personnel completed the Back Injury Prevention training this month that was required by the Village.

**Goal #3: Provide for a higher degree of personal contact between community and department personnel.**

Objective #1: All police personnel worked during the Shamrock ‘N Roll Road Race on March 10<sup>th</sup>.

Objective #2: Officers welcomed 1 new resident this month and provided the new residents with a police “Welcome Packet” describing many of the services offered by our department.

Objective #3: There were no requests for Child IDs this month.

Objective #4: Chief Campbell, Lt. Dozier, Sgt. Graham, Senior Officer McNeill, and Lisa Weaver attended the monthly LEO meeting. The meal for this month’s meeting was provided by Auxiliary Sgt. Cirillo’s computer business.

Objective #5: There was one request for installation of a child seat this month.

**Goal #4: Conduct special enforcement programs and participate in GHSP campaigns.**

Objective #1: Our department conducted an evening checkpoint on March 1<sup>st</sup> on Niagara Carthage Road @ Pine Lake Drive. Only 1 citation was written during this checkpoint for driving without a license. We also earned 50 points in the GHSP Step Reporting Program for conducting this checkpoint.

The department conducted a daytime checkpoint on March 9<sup>th</sup> on Ray’s Bridge Road. Officers wrote a total of 5 citations during this one-hour checkpoint. 3 of the citations were for driving with no operators license and 2 registration violations. We also earned 50 points in the NC GHSP Step Reporting Program for conducting this checkpoint.

A third checkpoint was conducted on Airport Road on March 15<sup>th</sup> in the evening. Officers only wrote one citation for no operating license during this checkpoint. We also earned a total of 50 points in the NC GHSP Step Reporting Program for conducting this checkpoint.

A fourth checkpoint was conducted on Spearhead Drive @ Wheatfield Way on March 22<sup>nd</sup>. Officers wrote 3 citations during this hour-long checkpoint for no operating license (2) and driving while license revoked (1). Our department also earned 50 points in the NC GHSP Step Reporting Program for conducting this checkpoint.

Our department participated in a night time checkpoint that was conducted by the Moore County Sheriff’s Office on March 30<sup>th</sup>. Our officer wrote 2 citations during this event. A total of 51 citations were issued by all participating departments during this checkpoint that was on US 1 at the Moore County and Lee County line. Our department also earned 75 points in the GHSP Step Reporting System for our participation.

**Goal #5: Continue current crime prevention programs to maintain the Village’s low crime statistics.**

Objective #1: We remain fully staffed.

Objective #2: We continued to work on traffic complaints already received for Sandpiper Drive, Spearhead Drive, and Windsong Place. Officer conducted 7 saturation patrols on Spearhead Drive, 5 saturation patrols on Windsong Place, and 4 saturation patrols on Sandpiper Drive.

Objective #3: Officers have conducted:  
House checks –435 (average 14 a day)  
Business checks – 999  
Store closings – 55

We continue to have a total of 10 seniors in the Senior Call In Program.

Objective #4: There were no requests for articles this month.

Objective #5: Officers have conducted 59 foot patrols at the Food Lion Shopping Center this month.

Objective #6: No traffic studies were conducted this month.

Objective #7: The two newest officers successfully completed the Child Seat Technician Certification Class. We now have 6 certified child seat technicians. 5 officers and the Sergeant are certified child seat technicians.

Objective #8: Additional building security cameras were installed this month. The camera system has been set up to allow viewing of all building cameras at once with the capability to enlarge any camera view when needed.

**Goal #6: Proactive approach in looking for safety concerns.**

Objective#1: The department purchased window breaking tool and seat belt cutter tool for each patrol vehicle.

Objective #2: Officers have conducted numerous saturation patrols this month on Spearhead Drive, Cardinal Drive, Sandpiper Drive, and Windsong Place.

Objective #3: In our efforts to meet OSHA requirements, quarterly and yearly reviews of the Infectious Disease Control Plan have been scheduled. The next quarterly review is scheduled for March 2018.

**Goal #7: Seek a new camera system for vehicle and body worn cameras.**

Objective #1: The new in-car camera system and management system has already been installed. All in-car cameras are functioning and the management system is storing all videos.

**Goal #8: Continue to participate in the Village's ongoing recycling program.**

Objective #1: The police department continues to participate in the Village recycling program.
