



From The Desk of Chief Domonic Campbell Monthly Report for Police Department

Date: November 1, 2017

Special Notes

We collected 3.3 pounds of pills this month.

Officer Dakota Hinson joined our department on October 9th and will begin his field training. He is a recent Basic Law Enforcement Training graduate and lives in Robbins. Our department is now fully staffed.

Our grant application for the FY 2017 Bulletproof Vest Program was approved. This grant will provide 50% reimbursement on the cost of a new bulletproof vest.

Sgt. Graham attended the Fall Festival event at St. Paul Lutheran Church on Saturday, October 28th. A police car was set up for attendees to see and he also handed out lollipops and stickers to the children.

Police Department construction is nearing completion. We expect to be moving in around the first of December.

This month we celebrated Senior Officer Holt's birthday.

Whispering Pines homeowners need to lock their vehicles. Recent vehicle break ins have all been unlocked vehicles. Pinehurst and Carthage have had numerous vehicle break ins during the same time period. Detectives from all agencies have been working hard to develop suspects in these cases.

Events of interest for the month of November 2017

1. There were thirty-two (32) incidents that were investigated this month.

- **October 1st – Found property.** Two teenagers reported finding a lawn mower behind the Summerfield subdivision. The officer went to the location and saw the lawn mower. The officer checked to see if it had been reported stolen but it had not. The officer picked up the mower and brought it back to the police station. It was later determined that the location where the lawn mower was found was actually in the Sheriff's Office jurisdiction at this time. The Sheriff's Office was notified and they picked up the lawn mower.
- **October 4th – Obtain property by false pretense.** One of our off duty officers happened to be in the Food Lion parking lot when he noticed a female walking towards the Food Lion. The officer recognized the female as a suspect from a fraud case that occurred at Food Lion on 9-13-17. The off duty officer contacted the on duty officers. The off duty officer watched as the female left Food Lion and got into a vehicle driven by a male. The vehicle then started to leave the parking lot. The off duty officer followed the vehicle until the on duty officers arrived. An on duty officer arrived and pulled the vehicle over on Highway 22. Food Lion was contacted and they stated the female had attempted to obtain a \$1,000 Western Union money order but the clerk denied the request after the female swiped the card 3 times and the card would not work. The female then wanted to enter the debit card information manually but the clerk refused to proceed with the transaction. Officers were able to confirm that this female was the same female involved in the 9-13-17 fraud at Food Lion. Officers searched the vehicle, the female's purse, and the male's wallet and seized numerous credit cards with various names, receipts for transactions at stores and banks, and paper with various banking notes and credit information. These items were seized for placement into evidence. The driver was issued a citation for driving while license revoked, displaying an expired registration plate, and concealing a registration plate. The male and the female were both placed under arrest.
- **October 5th – Driving while impaired, careless and reckless driving, and hit and run.** An officer received numerous calls about a careless and reckless driver on Airport Road. Then the officer was dispatched to an accident on Airport Road. When the officer arrived he saw a vehicle in the front yard of a residence on Airport Road. The vehicle had struck a tree. There was a man standing next to the vehicle with a knife to his throat and he said he wanted to die. The officer requested the man to put the knife down several times. The man started to walk towards the officer with the knife. Then the man stopped and got back into his vehicle but was unable to get the vehicle to move. Then the man got out of the vehicle and started walking towards the residence but then

began walking into the woods next to the house. Additional officers started arriving and one assisted our officer with following the man into the woods. The man was stumbling through the woods and then threw the knife down in the direction of the officers. The man then began to climb through a briar bush. Both officers were able to catch the man and place him under arrest. The man was combative and continued to say that he wanted the officers to kill him. The man had a lot of blood on him and also the officer could detect the odor of alcohol. With the assistance of several officers the man was brought out of the woods on a backboard and into the ambulance. He was taken to the hospital with two deputies riding along to control the man. Our officer confiscated the knife, and searched the vehicle where a bottle of pills were found with a large number of pills missing from the bottle. The officer also took statements from several witnesses that saw the man driving carelessly and recklessly or witnessed the accident when it occurred. The officer arranged for a tow truck to tow the vehicle. The officer then went to the Magistrate's office to obtain a warrant to have the man's blood drawn. The warrant was delivered at the hospital and blood was drawn from the man for testing. The driver was issued citations for driving while impaired, careless and reckless driving, failure to maintain lane control, failure to stop at a stop sign, and hit and run.

- **October 5th – Involuntary commitment.** After the above incident the officer went to the Magistrate's office to get involuntary commitment paperwork since the man had stated numerous times that he wanted to die and even told hospital staff that if he had a gun he would kill himself. The officer delivered the commitment papers to the hospital. The officer stood by at the hospital until 3:00 am when hospital staff stated it was safe to remove the handcuffs from the man. After getting the necessary signatures at the hospital the officer delivered the involuntary commitment paperwork to the Magistrate's office.
- **October 7th – Involuntary commitment.** A resident of Lavender Drive requested advice on how to deal with a mentally ill 18 year old. The officer advised the family to go the Magistrate's office and attempt to take out an involuntary commitment order if they wished. The family spoke with the Magistrate and was able to obtain involuntary commitment papers. The 18 year old was not home at that time but the family stated they would call when she returned home. A short time later they called to indicate she was home to pack some of her things. The officer arrived and advised the 18 year old of the commitment paperwork. She was very upset and yelling at her mother. She had a purse on her shoulder and kept her hand inside of the purse. The officer told her to take her hand out of the purse and held onto her wrist. The officer then searched the purse and found a small knife inside. The knife was removed and after the officer was sure there were no other weapons in the purse he gave her the purse back. The female was placed in handcuffs and transported to the

hospital. The officer sat with the female until she was examined by a doctor. About 2 ½ hours later the officer was advised that he could leave as the female had calmed down. The hospital contacted the officer about 1 ½ hours later to advise that the female was going to be released as they felt she was not a danger to herself. The female wanted the officer to take her home but the mother stated she did not want her back in the house. The female decided to arrange her own transportation.

- **October 7th – Violation of Village ordinance (barking dog).** A resident of Martin Drive reported that his next door neighbor's dogs had been barking since midnight for about 5 hours. The officer attempted to contact the dog owner but no one was home. A few days later the officer found the dog owner home and issued a civil penalty to the dog owner. This is the second civil penalty issued to this dog owner.
- **October 11th - Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Pine Lake Drive reported finding a dog in her yard. An officer picked up the dog and placed the dog in the kennel at the police department. A few hours later the owner of the dog came to the police department to pick up the dog. The dog owner was issued a warning ticket for the violation since this was the first violation.
- **October 12th – Communicating threats.** A resident of Martin Drive reported receiving a phone call from her adult son threatening her. The resident went to the Magistrate and obtained a warrant for communicating threats. The adult son is staying at a location in Southern Pines so our officer contacted Southern Pines Police to advise them of the warrant.
- **October 15th – Simple possession of a Schedule II controlled substance and driving while revoked due to impaired revocation.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer determined that the driver's license was revoked due to an impaired driving charge. The driver gave consent to let the officer search the vehicle and the officer found a Percocet pill. The officer seized the pill for placement into evidence. The driver was given a warning ticket for a mirror and plate light violation, a citation for driving while license revoked for an impaired revocation, expired registration, and inspection violation. The driver was then placed under arrest.
- **October 16th – Identity theft.** A resident of Niagara Carthage Road reported that someone used her bank information to make 5 purchases totaling \$2,560.00 at a store in Colorado. The resident closed down the bank account.
- **October 16th – Neglect of elder adult.** Our department received a report from Moore County Department of Social Services about a referral from the adult son of Martin Drive residents. The son stated that he is concerned for his elderly father. He believes his mother has been physically and verbally abusive to his father for a long time. An officer spoke to the father and he indicated that he is

not being abused and is well taken care of. The officer saw no signs of any abuse.

- **October 17th – Breaking and entering a motor vehicle and larceny from a motor vehicle.** A resident of Morning Glory Lane reported that someone had gone through 4 of their 6 unlocked vehicles that were in the driveway during the night. Someone entered two of the vehicles and went through the interiors of the vehicles but didn't take anything from either vehicle. A third vehicle was gone through and \$80.00 was taken from a wallet that had been left in the vehicle. A fourth vehicle was also entered and a pair of sunglasses had been taken out of this vehicle. Another resident on Morning Glory reported that someone had gone through their vehicle but nothing had been taken.
- **October 17th – Breaking and entering a motor vehicle.** A resident of Airport Road reported that someone had gone into her unlocked vehicle and rummaged around but nothing was taken. This resident also had some camera footage of a suspect walking between her house and her vehicle. The footage only caught the suspect from the back and all that can be made out is the color of the tennis shoe the suspect was wearing. Another resident of Airport Road reported that someone had gone through two of their unlocked vehicles during the night. Nothing was taken from either vehicle.
- **October 17th – Breaking and entering a motor vehicle.** 3 residents of Lavender Drive reported having unlocked vehicles that had been rummaged through during the night. Nothing was taken from any of vehicles. One of the residents found their car doors closed but it was apparent that someone went through their vehicle as items were tossed around the inside of the vehicles. The other two residents found their car doors open this morning and items strewn about inside their vehicles.
- **October 17th – Breaking and entering a motor vehicle and larceny of a firearm.** 2 residents of Whisper Grove Court reported that someone went through their unlocked vehicles during the night. One resident said she found her vehicle door open in the morning and everything had been thrown around inside her vehicle but nothing had been taken. Another resident reported that two of their unlocked vehicles had been gone through and a firearm was taken from one of the vehicles.
- **October 17th – Breaking and entering a motor vehicle and larceny from a motor vehicle.** 4 residents of Sunflower Court reported that someone went into their unlocked vehicles sometime during the night. All of the residents found their vehicle doors open in the morning and the contents of their vehicles were strewn all over the vehicle. 1 resident reported that \$40.00 in cash was taken from her vehicle. The other 3 residents did not have anything taken from their vehicles.

- **October 17th – Breaking and entering a motor vehicle.** 2 residents of Winding Trail reported having unlocked vehicles broken into during the night. Both residents found the doors to their vehicles open and the contents inside their vehicles had been tossed all around the inside of the vehicle. Nothing was found missing in either vehicle.
- **October 17th – Natural death.** Officers received a call about a man found on the ground at the Whispering Pines Country Club. When the officers arrived fire/rescue personnel were already on scene performing CPR. The officers found three men who were friends of the patient at the scene. All four men were from the Greensboro/Winston Salem area and were all staying at the villas. One of the friends found him on the ground and called for help. Fire/rescue personnel were unable to revive the patient and pronounced him dead. The officer contacted the medical examiner who came to the scene. Officers stayed at the scene until the funeral home arrived to transport the body. The officer provided the friends with the phone number for the medical examiner and our police department to provide to the man's spouse.
- **October 17th – Violation of Village ordinance (vicious animal).** A resident of South Lakeshore Drive was out walking when a neighbor's dog came running out of the yard towards her barking and acting vicious. She yelled at the dog but the dog kept coming towards her. So she kicked the dog to prevent being attacked and the dog ran back into its yard. The dog belonged to an out of state guest of a South Lakeshore Drive resident and the guest has returned home with the dog.
- **October 18th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Lakeview Drive found 2 loose dogs in her yard. She put the dogs in her vehicle and brought them to the police department. An officer recognized the dogs as belonging to a Fairway Drive resident. The officer was unable to make contact with the dog owner so he had Animal Control pick up the dogs. A friend of the resident stated the resident went to the hospital and will be there for some time. The friend retrieved the dogs from Animal Control and will take care of them until the resident returns home. The dog owner was issued a civil penalty for this violation when he returned home later in the month. This is the 13th violation for this dog owner (12th civil penalty).
- **October 18th – Damage to property.** A resident of Goldenrod Drive reported that they found 2 windows that had been broken in their basement. An officer observed that one of the windows was just cracked and on the second window only the outer glass of the double pane was broken. The officer noted that one of the windows looked like it had an imprint of a small ball on it. The resident's son stated that he didn't do it and the resident has no idea when it actually occurred.

- **October 18th – Psychiatric/threatened suicide.** A suicide hotline contacted 911 to advise that a resident on Fairway Drive told them he was going to kill himself and then hung up. When the officer arrived on scene the resident appeared calm but told the officer he was upset. The resident stated he had someone coming over to talk to him and he didn't want to speak to the officer yet. A man came by and talked with the resident for a little while. The resident then agreed to let EMS take him to the hospital and he would voluntarily get help at the hospital.
- **October 19th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Ray's Bridge Road reported two dogs were running loose on Ray's Bridge Road. The officer was beginning to load the dogs into his vehicle when the dog owner came up to retrieve her dogs. The officer issued the dog owner a warning ticket for the violation as this was the first violation.
- **October 21st – Breaking and entering.** A resident of Pine Ridge Drive reported that she just returned home and found her front door open. The resident did not find anything missing or out of place. Officers could not find any pry marks on the door. The officer also had the resident check the house once again to see if anything was missing and nothing was found to be missing.
- **October 21st – Violation of Village ordinance (vicious dog).** A resident of Herons Brook Drive reported that his father-in-law had been out walking when he heard a female voice yelling and looked toward the direction of the voice. He then saw a dog jumping toward his face so he put his arm up to protect his face. The dog bit his father-in-law's arm. A young girl called the dog and took the dog inside a house. The father-in-law went to get medical attention for his dog bite. Officers obtained a statement from the father-in-law and obtained photos of the dog bite to his arm. The officer then went to the neighbor's house who own the dog. The dog owners acknowledged that their dog has some aggressive tendencies. The officers issued a civil penalty to the dog owner for the first violation of this type.
- **October 21st – Natural death.** An officer was dispatched to a Birdie Drive residence and was told CPR was being conducted. When the officer arrived he found a male who had collapsed on the floor and a younger male was standing over him. The officer noticed the male was unconscious so the officer started doing CPR until the rescue department arrived. EMS arrived and they continued to work on the male patient. They were unable to revive him and he was pronounced deceased. The officer contacted the medical examiner and the medical examiner came to the scene. The officer contacted the funeral home for the spouse and stayed with the family until the funeral home arrived.
- **October 21st – Driving while impaired.** An officer observed a truck use a turning lane to pass a vehicle and then rapidly speed up. The officer began to pursue the vehicle and verified the vehicle was speeding and witnessed the

vehicle veer to the right striking a curb. The vehicle finally pulled off the roadway and when the officer approached the vehicle the officer noted the driver's eyes were very red, bloodshot and appeared to have a glaze over them. The driver seemed to have difficulty with following the officer's directions. The driver indicated that he had two beers earlier. The officer had the driver step out of the vehicle to perform several roadside field sobriety tests. The vehicle started to roll as the driver had not put the vehicle in park. He was able to finally stop the vehicle and get out. The driver did not perform well in the roadside tests. The officer placed the driver under arrest for driving while impaired, careless and reckless driving, and passing in a no passing zone.

- **October 23rd – Breaking and entering, larceny, and larceny of a firearm.** A resident of South Lakeshore Drive reported that someone entered his home and took a watch and a revolver. The only people who have been at his home were two men who were doing yard work. One of the men was the regular yard man but he had a new person with him on this day. The resident said a sliding door to the home was unlocked and he could tell someone used the door as the curtains that are always kept closed were moved. The new yard employee was questioned and he finally admitted to stealing the watch and gun. He sold both items to someone else. The gun and watch were recovered 4 days later.
- **October 26th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Herons Brook Drive reported finding a loose dog. The officer picked up the dog and recognized the dog. The dog was returned to his owner who lives on Fairway Lane. The dog owner will be issued a civil penalty for this violation when the officer can find the dog owner at home.
- **October 28th – Driving while impaired.** An officer observed a vehicle traveling well below the speed limit around 1:30 am. The vehicle also had a broken tail light so the officer followed the vehicle for a bit before pulling the vehicle over. The officer detected the odor of alcohol when speaking to the driver. The driver had difficulty finding her driver's license even though it was sitting in her purse right beside her. The officer asked the driver if she had been drinking and she stated she had 3 beers. The officer had the driver perform several roadside field sobriety tests. The driver did not do well on the tests. The officer placed the driver under arrest.
- **October 30th – Missing person.** A resident of Harmon Drive reported that her ex-husband had their daughter for the weekend but was supposed to take her to school Monday morning. The resident found out that her daughter was not in school and no one was home at her ex-husband's home which is also in Whispering Pines. The ex-husband would not answer his cell phone. The resident filed a missing person report for her daughter. The ex-husband returned their daughter to her mother during the night.

- **October 30th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Airport Road reported finding a dog running loose and she placed the dog in her yard to keep the dog safe. An officer picked up the dog and placed the dog in the pen at the police department. A resident of Lavender Drive called the police department in the evening stating that the dog we were holding was hers. The resident had her brother pick up the dog from the police department. The dog owner was issued a warning ticket for the violation the following day since this was the first violation.

2. There were ten (10) arrests this month with a total of 13 charges.

After an arrest, officers are unavailable for at least 2 hours while processing and booking subjects at the Moore County Jail in Carthage. Serving a criminal summons does not require detaining or taking the subject to jail.

- **October 5th – (4 arrests)** As a result of a call from one of our off duty officers about seeing a suspect in the September 13th obtaining property by false pretense case that occurred at Food Lion, an on duty officer located the vehicle after it left the Food Lion parking lot. A female in the vehicle had just attempted to purchase a Western Union money order at Food Lion but the debit card did not work and the store clerk would not allow the female to manually enter the card information. The officer stopped the vehicle. Paper had been placed in front of the license plate blocking it completely. The officer determined that the male driver had a suspended driver's license. Both the driver and the passenger were placed under arrest for the September 13th Food Lion obtaining property by false pretense incident and also arrested for the attempted obtaining property by false pretense incident at Food Lion on this date. Both individuals were transported to the Moore County Jail.
- **October 13th** – As a result of an accident and incident that occurred on October 5th, the officer later learned that the driver of the vehicle had also struck a mailbox on Cardinal Drive and left the scene of the accident. The driver later had another accident on Airport Road. The officer went to the Magistrate's Office to obtain a criminal summons for the damage to the mailbox. The officer served the driver with the criminal summons at the police department.
- **October 15th** – As a result of a traffic stop for a mirror and plate violation, the officer also determined that the driver had a revoked driver's license for an impaired driving charge, an expired registration, and an inspection violation. A search of the vehicle was conducted and the officer found a Percocet pill that had been hidden in the vehicle. The driver was placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.
- **October 16th** – Our department had taken out a warrant for the adult son of a resident for communicating threats on October 12th. The adult son has been

staying in Southern Pines and the warrant was served on the adult son by the Southern Pines Police Department.

- **October 21st** – An officer observed a vehicle passing a vehicle by using a center turn lane, speeding, and veering off of the roadway and striking a curb. The driver gave the appearance of being impaired when the officer approached the vehicle. The officer stopped the vehicle and had the driver perform several roadside field sobriety tests. The driver did not perform well on the tests. The officer placed the driver under arrest and transported him to the Moore County Jail. The driver had a blood alcohol content of .19.
- **October 28th** – As a result of a traffic stop the officer detected the odor of alcohol when speaking to the driver. The officer had the driver perform several roadside field sobriety tests and the driver did not do well on any of them. The driver was placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail. The driver had a .18 blood alcohol content.
- **October 31st** – As a result of a traffic stop the officer determined that the driver had a revoked license. He issued the driver a citation for this violation. The officer also determined that the driver had an outstanding order for arrest out of Brunswick County for failure to appear on driving without a license and expired registration charges. The driver was placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.

3. There were two (2) traffic accidents in the Village this month.

- **October 5th**- An accident occurred on Airport Road. A vehicle ran off the side of the road and struck a mailbox. The vehicle left the scene of the crash and continued traveling down Princess Gate Drive. The vehicle went through a stop sign on Princess Gate and crossed over Airport Road and struck a tree. The vehicle came to rest in the front yard of a residence. The driver was found outside of the vehicle holding a knife to his throat. The driver was charged with driving while subject to an impairing substance. After the driver was caught in the woods by officers he was carried out on a backboard to the ambulance by several officers. He was then transported to the hospital. The vehicle had to be towed from the scene.
- **October 13th** – An accident occurred in the Food Lion parking lot. A vehicle was trying to park in front of another parked vehicle and failed to stop before colliding with the parked vehicle. The driver was issued a citation for unsafe movement. There were no injuries and both vehicles were able to be driven from the scene.

4. Safety (Department)

- Lt. Dozier updated the contents of the biohazard kits in all of the police vehicles. Each kit contains biohazard suits, safety glasses, face masks, and a biohazard waste disposal bags.
- The department continues to provide training to officers.

5. Safety (Village)

- Officers assisted with the Halloween event at the Community Center on October 31st. Also we had extra officers on patrol during the hours of trick or treating. One officer worked the Arrowstone area due to the heavy concentration of trick or treaters in this area.

6. Other Events of Interest

- **October 3rd** – Participated in the Fort Bragg 100th birthday video shoot on Memorial Causeway with other Village departments.
- **October 4th – 6th** – Chief Campbell and Sgt. Graham attended the Management Development Program Alumni Association 2017 Fall Conference in Boone, NC. Topics covered during this conference included Leadership: building Shared Purpose and Consciousness, Ethical Leadership, and Internal Affairs/Employee Law.
- **October 10th** – Chief Campbell attended the 911 meeting that was held in Carthage.
- **October 11th** – Chief Campbell attended the monthly Investigators Meeting that was held at Vass Police Department. Issues of common concern are discussed among local law enforcement agencies during these meetings.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Goal #1: To provide a uniform standard that will enable personnel of the department to be more consistent in procedures when handling situations.

Objective #1: Daily briefings are being conducted by officers at shift changes. The Lieutenant and Sergeant have also discussed monthly schedule and operational concerns with all officers this month.

Objective #2: There were no revised policies this month.

Objective #3: All officers completed policy reviews of General Order 026– Field Training and Evaluation Program and General Order 027 – Automated External Defibrillator.

Goal #2: To provide for education and further development of department personnel to enhance officer and department professionalism.

Objective #1: This month the officers watched a training video about an incident that occurred in Texas. An officer observed a male chasing another male and got out to investigate. The officer was shot during this encounter. The video serves as a reminder for officers to always assume a subject may be armed until otherwise known.

Senior Officer McNeill successfully completed his DCI – General Inquires recertification test and is recertified for two more years.

Sgt. Graham completed the state mandated in-service training Improving Decision-Making Skills on October 22nd.

Senior Officer McNeill completed the state mandated in-service training Positively Impacting Today's Youth, Legal Updates, Improving Decision-Making Skills, and Protecting Victims of Domestic Violence this month.

Officer Strickland completed the state mandated in-service training Protecting Victims of Domestic Violence on October 23rd.

Goal #3: Provide for a higher degree of personal contact between community and department personnel.

Objective #1: Officers assisted with the Halloween event that was held at the Community Center. Officers provided lights and cones to assist with parking. Extra officers were on duty patrolling during the hours of trick or treating and one officer stayed in the Arrowstone area due to the heavy concentration of trick or treaters in that neighborhood.

Sgt. Graham spoke to several Cub Scout groups on October 30th at Sandhills Farm Life School. He spoke about being a police officer and answered questions from the children.

Objective #2: Officers welcomed 19 new residents this month and provided the new residents with a police "Welcome Packet" describing many of the services offered by our department.

Objective #3: There were no requests for Child IDs this month.

Objective #4: Chief Campbell, Senior Officer McNeill and Officer Hinson attended the monthly LEO meeting on October 26th.

Objective #5: There were no requests for child seat installations this month.

Goal #4: Conduct special enforcement programs and participate in GHSP campaigns.

Objective #1: There were no checkpoints conducted this month.

Goal #5: Continue current crime prevention programs to maintain the Village's low crime statistics.

Objective #1: We are fully staffed.

Objective #2: A complaint had been received last month about speeding on Niagara Carthage Road. Officers conducted 2 saturation patrols and also used the radar trailer in the 45 mph zone. Results showed the average speed was 44 mph. Most vehicles that were speeding were in the 46 – 50 mph range.

Officers also conducted 1 saturation patrol on Whisper Lake Drive, 4 saturation patrols on Spearhead Drive, 5 saturation patrols on South Lakeshore Drive, 4 saturation patrols on Lakeview Drive.

Objective #3: Officers have conducted:
House checks – 492 (average 16 a day)
Business checks – 869
Store closings – 43

We continue to have 9 residents enrolled in our Senior Call In Program.

Objective #4: There were no requests for articles this month.

Objective #5: Officers have conducted 49 foot patrols at the Food Lion Shopping Center this month.

Objective #6: A traffic study was conducted on Niagara Carthage Road in a 45 mph zone. The results shows that the average speed was 44 mph. 56% of vehicles were traveling at or below the posted speed limit. The majority of vehicles traveling above the speed limit were in the 46 -50 mph range.

Objective #7: We now have 4 certified child seat technicians. 3 officers and the Sergeant are certified child seat technicians.

Objective #8: We replaced the old department cell phone with a newer cell phone. The old phone was beginning to have problems and was almost 3 years old.

Goal #6: Proactive approach in looking for safety concerns.

Objective#1: Lt. Dozier updated the contents of the biohazard kits in all of the police vehicles. Each kit contains biohazard suits, safety glasses, face masks, and a biohazard waste disposal bags.

The department continues to provide training to officers.

Objective #2: Officers assisted with the Halloween event at the Community Center on October 31st. Also we had extra officers on patrol during the hours of trick or treating. One officer worked the Arrowstone area due to the heavy concentration of trick or treaters in this area.

Objective #3: In our efforts to meet OSHA requirements, quarterly and yearly reviews of the Infectious Disease Control Plan have been scheduled. The next quarterly review is scheduled for December 31st.

Goal #7: Seek a new camera system for vehicle and body worn cameras.

Objective #1: The new in-car camera system has arrived. Installation will begin when the police department construction is complete.

Goal #8: Continue to participate in the Village's ongoing recycling program.

Objective #1: The police department continues to participate in the Village recycling program even while temporarily working at Village Hall.
