### **Special Notes**

**We collected 4.57 pounds of pills this month.**

**Our Bulletproof Vest grant application for FY 2018 was approved. This grant will allow our department to receive 50% reimbursement on up to 3 bulletproof vests that our department may purchase during the term of this grant (through August 31, 2020).**

**We also received a NC League of Municipalities Soft Body Armor Grant in the amount of \$250.00 for one bulletproof vest that was purchased for our newest officer.**

**We are still expecting reimbursement from the Bulletproof Vest Program as well which should reimburse us for 50% of the cost of the vest, which will further reduce the net cost of the vest.**

**Chief Campbell and Sgt. Cirillo attended a demonstration in Charlotte on the conference room smart board/Tv technology we intend to purchase and install in our new conference room.**

**The new police vehicle has arrived and will be outfitted. The 2013 Dodge Charger will be stripped of equipment in preparation for auction in the next 2 weeks.**

## Events of interest for the month of October 2018

1. **There were twenty-six (26) incidents that were investigated this month. Of these incidents twelve (12) involved an arrest with 25 total charges.**

*After an arrest, officers are unavailable for at least 2 hours while processing and booking subjects at the Moore County Jail in Carthage. Serving a criminal summons does not require detaining or taking the subject to jail.*

- **October 2<sup>nd</sup> – Driving while impaired.** An officer observed a vehicle traveling very slowly and failing to maintain lane control. The officer stopped the vehicle and noticed a strong odor of alcohol when he approached the vehicle. The officer had the driver perform several roadside field sobriety tests. The driver did not do well on the tests. The driver was placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail. The driver had a .12 blood alcohol content level.
- **October 3<sup>rd</sup> – Found property.** A resident of Martin Way found a wallet on the side of Sandpiper Drive and turned it in to the police department. An officer located the owner and returned the wallet to him. The owner said everything was still in his wallet.
- **October 5<sup>th</sup> – Possession of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia.** A vehicle that came through the license checkpoint that the department was conducting had a distinct odor of marijuana coming from the vehicle. A passenger in the vehicle told the officer he had some marijuana. The officer located a small bag of marijuana and a cigarillo pack in the vehicle. The items were photographed and then seized for placement into evidence. The passenger was arrested by citation for possession of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia.
- **October 6<sup>th</sup> – Dog bite.** An officer was delivering a police services booklet to a new resident on Pine Ridge Drive when the resident's dogs jumped on the officer and one of the dogs bit the officer's hand. The dog owner advised that they would not be giving the officer any personal information. Moore County Animal Control was contacted to obtain information regarding the dog's vaccinations. The officer was checked out at the hospital and had the wound cleaned and disinfected. Moore County Animal Control was able to obtain vaccination records for the dog showing that it had been vaccinated for rabies. The dog owner stated she would be considering filing a complaint for the officer coming onto her property without permission. Eventually the officer met with the other dog owner and was able to discuss having better relations between the dog owners and the police department.

- **October 7<sup>th</sup> – Driving while impaired.** An officer observed a vehicle with an expired registration plate and while trying to pull the vehicle over, the officer observed the vehicle swerving back and forth within the lane of travel. After the vehicle pulled over and the officer approached the vehicle the officer detected a strong odor of alcohol. The driver's eyes were bloodshot and the driver's speech was slow and slurred. The officer had the driver perform several roadside field sobriety tests. The driver did not do well on any of the tests. The officer also obtained consent to search the vehicle. The officer observed multiple items of marijuana paraphernalia on the shoulder of the road next to where the vehicle stopped. These items were seized for placement into evidence. The officer placed the driver under arrest and transported him to the Moore County Jail. The driver was charged with driving while impaired, possession of marijuana paraphernalia, open container in vehicle, expired registration, and an inspection violation. The driver had a blood alcohol content of .13.
- **October 8<sup>th</sup> – Found property.** An officer was cleaning his patrol vehicle when he found a set of keys under the front passenger seat. The officer knew the keys belonged to the individual he had arrested the day before. The officer contacted the owner of the keys. The owner showed up and took possession of his keys.
- **October 9<sup>th</sup> – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Birdie Drive reported that there were 2 dogs running at large. These dogs run around regularly and the owners also live on Birdie Drive. The officer went to the dog owner's residence and informed the resident of the ordinance pertaining to dogs. The dog owner was issued a warning ticket for the violation since this was the first reported incident.
- **October 9<sup>th</sup> – Larceny.** A resident of Pine Lake Drive reported that someone took a fishing box off of his back porch. The resident reported that the fishing box was returned to his residence a few days later.
- **October 12<sup>th</sup> – Possession of drug and marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop, the officer determined that two passengers in the vehicle had active warrants or active orders for arrest. When having the front seat passenger step out he found a marijuana bowl and a can with a cut straw that is used to inhale certain drugs. These items were seized for placement into evidence and the passenger was charged with possession of drug and marijuana paraphernalia. The front seat passenger also had an active order for arrest out of Robeson County for failure to appear on a communicating threats charge. This passenger also had three orders for arrest out of Robeson County for child support violations. This passenger was placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail. The officer determined that the back-seat passenger had active warrants out of Hoke County for larceny, communicating threats, and assault on

- a female. This passenger was also placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.
- **October 12<sup>th</sup> – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Canal Lane reported finding a dog running loose and has been unable to find the owner of the dog. An officer picked up the dog and placed the dog in the pen at the police department. A short time later a South Lakeshore Drive resident called to see if we had found her missing dog. The dog owner came to the police department to pick up her dog. The dog owner was issued a warning ticket for the violation since this was the first violation.
  - **October 13<sup>th</sup> – Possession of marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer detected the odor of marijuana. The driver gave the officer permission to search the vehicle. The officer found a grinder and scales. These items were photographed and then seized for placement into evidence. The driver was issued citations for displaying a revoked registration plate, operating a vehicle with no insurance, driving while license revoked, and possession of marijuana paraphernalia. The officer determined that a passenger in the vehicle was initially giving the officer a false name. Once the officer obtained the passenger's correct name the officer determined that the passenger had an active order for arrest out of Moore County for failing to appear on a marijuana charge. The passenger was placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.
  - **October 15<sup>th</sup> – Larceny.** A candidate that is running for an upcoming position reported that about 12 campaign signs were either stolen or damaged overnight. The signs were located in several different areas in Whispering Pines.
  - **October 16<sup>th</sup> – Larceny.** A resident of Bogie Drive reported that someone struck her mailbox with a vehicle and left the scene. The mailbox post was still on the ground but the actual mailbox was gone and appears it had been taken by whoever hit the mailbox.
  - **October 16<sup>th</sup> – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Lakeview Drive reported that there were two dogs running around in their backyard. An officer went to the scene and picked up the dogs. The dogs were placed in the pen at the police department. Another officer recognized the dogs and contacted the dog owner. The dog owner came to pick up her dogs and was given a civil penalty since this was the third violation.
  - **October 18<sup>th</sup> – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident reported that there was a loose dog on Sabbatia Drive. An officer picked up the dog and returned the dog to the owner who lives on Princess Gate Drive. The officer issued the dog owner a civil penalty for the violation as this was the second violation for this dog owner.
  - **October 19<sup>th</sup> – Obtain property by false pretense.** A Food Lion employee reported that someone gave them counterfeit bills for a purchase. The employee recognized that the \$20 dollar bills were fake and called his supervisor over. The

- customer was not able to purchase the gift card. The store kept the counterfeit money and gave it to the officer. The officer observed surveillance video that shows the customer in the store and leaving the store. A manager at another Food Lion recognized the customer as a former employee. The officer then went to the Magistrate to obtain a warrant for attempted obtaining property by false pretense.
- **October 19<sup>th</sup> – Carrying concealed weapon.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer approached the vehicle for the second time and asked the driver if he had any drugs or weapons in the vehicle. The driver indicated he had a hunting knife in the area between his seat and the console. The knife was completely concealed from the officer. The officer searched the vehicle and found the long fixed blade knife in a sheath. The officer photographed the knife and then seized the knife for placement into evidence. The driver was arrested by citation for carrying a concealed weapon.
  - **October 20<sup>th</sup> – Possession of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer observed a pack of cigarillos and a set of digital scales in the vehicle when he approached the vehicle. He asked the driver about the items and if there was anything else in the vehicle. The driver admitted to also having marijuana in the vehicle. The officer searched the entire vehicle and found a couple of cigarillo packs, a digital scale, and a jar with three packages of marijuana inside. The officer photographed these items and then seized them for placement into evidence. The officer issued the driver a citation for driving while license revoked and insurance violation. The driver was also arrested by citation for possession of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia.
  - **October 23<sup>rd</sup> – Resist, delay, and obstruct.** Officers were called to a domestic dispute in progress at a residence on Spearhead Drive. When officers arrived, the husband was holding his wife to keep her from hitting him. The officer had him let go and he advised the wife to sit down. The wife refused to obey anything the officer told her. After repeatedly asking her to sit down and her refusing, the officer placed her under arrest. The officer did not find any signs of injury on either party. The husband stated the wife had a knife and had threatened to hurt herself so that was why he was holding her. The officer released the wife via citation and then transported her to the hospital to be evaluated. She was admitted to the hospital.
  - **October 25<sup>th</sup> – Obtaining property under false pretense.** A resident of Morning Glory Lane reported that he was a victim of fraud. The resident advised that the day before he received a message on his computer from “Microsoft” saying his computer was infected by a virus and he needed to call a phone number to resolve the issue. The resident called the number and he was told that they would need to get on his computer remotely to fix the problem. They also asked him if he wanted lifetime protection for a fee of \$480. The

resident gave them his credit card information. These people called back and advised the resident that they had accidentally charged his credit card twice and needed his bank account number to make a deposit into his account and the resident gave them this information. They then claimed they deposited too much money into his bank account and would need \$4,000 back from him. They told him to go to Walmart and purchase three \$1,000 gift cards. The resident purchased these gift cards and then went home and called the people back to give them the gift card numbers over the phone. He was told to destroy the cards after giving them the card numbers. The resident tried to contact the people again the following day and couldn't reach them so he called the police. The officer advised the resident that he had been a victim of a scam. The officer also advised the resident to contact his credit card company and his bank. In addition, they recommended that he unplug his computer and contact a computer technician to clean his computer.

- **October 28<sup>th</sup> – Theft from motor vehicle.** An employee of FirstHealth Convenient Care reported that someone had smashed in her rear passenger window of her vehicle. She stated that her purse and wallet were missing from the vehicle. Officers dusted the vehicle for fingerprints. Earlier in the day employees heard a crash outside but no one thought anything of it. An officer advised the victim to cancel her credit cards and contact her bank. Later, the victim advised that her bank had contacted her to say that someone had used her debit card at a gas station in Apex.
- **October 30<sup>th</sup> – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** An officer observed a Goldenrod Drive resident walking her dog without a leash. The dog owner felt since the dog had a shock collar that was good enough. The dog owner was advised that the ordinance requires dogs to be leashed. The dog owner was issued a warning ticket for the violation.
- **October 30<sup>th</sup> – Felony probation violation and possession of marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer detected the odor of marijuana when he approached the vehicle. The driver claimed not to have her license with her so the officer asked for her name and date of birth. The driver gave the officer a name of a person that the officer was familiar with so he knew the driver was giving him a false name. After being confronted by the officer the driver gave him her real name. When the officer ran her information and became aware that her license was revoked and she had a felony probation violation warrant out of Moore County. The officer also searched the vehicle and found a couple packs of cigarillos and marijuana residue laying around inside the vehicle. The officer seized these items. The officer issued the driver citations for displaying a fictitious registration plate, driving while license revoked, giving fictitious information to an officer, possessing marijuana

paraphernalia, and operating a vehicle with an inspection violation. The driver was then placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.

- **October 31<sup>st</sup> – Felony larceny.** A resident of South Lakeshore Drive reported that a shotgun was missing from his home. He kept it in a bedroom closet but he just noticed that it is gone. He has had various workers in his home over the last several months but doesn't think any of them would take his shotgun.
- **October 31<sup>st</sup> – Village ordinance violation (dog at large).** A resident of Lakewood Court found a dog running loose. On the way to the location the officer was flagged down by a resident on Lakeview Drive who had found a dog running loose. The officer placed the dog in his patrol vehicle. The officer recognized the dog as belonging to a Fairway Lane resident. The officer then proceeded onto South Lakeshore Drive to pick up the other dog. When the officer arrived, he recognized this dog as also belonging to the Fairway Lane resident. The officer put this dog in his patrol vehicle as well. The officer put the dogs in the kennel at the police department. The officer contacted the dog owner who came to pick up his dogs. The officer issued the dog owner a civil penalty as this is the dog owner's 4<sup>th</sup> violation within the last year.
- **October 31<sup>st</sup> – Verbal domestic.** An officer was originally advised that there had been a 911 hang up call from a Spearhead Drive residence. The officer began traveling to the residence when he was advised that a female from the residence called 911 to advise she had called accidentally. The officer continued to the residence to ensure everything was okay. When the officer arrived, he spoke with a female who indicated her and her husband had been having a verbal argument and he left the house. The husband returned home a few moments later. Both parties had been drinking and arguing about their marriage. No physical altercation occurred. Both parties agreed to sleep in different parts of the house to allow both of them to calm down.

## **2. There were four (4) traffic accidents in the Village this month.**

- **October 4<sup>th</sup>** – A resident of Pine Ridge Drive reported that someone had hit their mailbox with a vehicle and also the neighbor's mailbox. It appears that a vehicle struck a tree and then hit the two mailboxes. The vehicle left the scene.
- **October 6<sup>th</sup>** – A vehicle was traveling on the roadway when the driver suffered a medical condition. The vehicle then ran off the roadway, driving into a ditch, overriding a culvert and striking a tree. When the officer arrived, the driver was unresponsive and the passenger appeared uninjured. CPR was given to the driver with success. Both subjects were transported to the hospital. The vehicle had to be towed from the scene.
- **October 15<sup>th</sup>** – An accident occurred in the parking lot in front of Subway. A vehicle was backing and hit a vehicle that was in the travel lane. There were no injuries reported and the both vehicles were able to be driven from the scene.

- **October 16<sup>th</sup>** – An unknown driver ran off the road and struck a mailbox on Bogie Drive. The unknown driver took the mailbox but left the broken wooden post, before driving off.

### **3. Safety (Department)**

- All sworn personnel completed annual firearms training as well as Hazardous Materials training.

### **4. Safety (Village)**

- Provided extra officers for security at the Halloween event and concert.
- Provided extra officers for security on Halloween. No issues were reported.
- A checkpoint was conducted this month in multiple locations around the Village.

### **5. Other Events of Interest**

- **October 2<sup>nd</sup>** – Sgt. Graham attended a meeting at Sandhills Community College to assist in the preparation of an upcoming Active Shooter Training event.
- **October 2<sup>nd</sup> – 5<sup>th</sup>** – Lt. Dozier attended the Field Liaison Officer (FLO) Certification training that was held in Charlotte by State Bureau of Investigation. A FLO is an identified person within a law enforcement agency who is responsible for reporting and disseminating suspicious activity and other criminal information to their local agency and to the Information Sharing and Analysis Center (ISAAC).
- **October 10<sup>th</sup>** – Lt. Dozier attended the monthly Investigators Meeting that was held at the Vass Police Department this month. Local law enforcement agencies share issues of common concern among the agencies.
- **October 10<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup>** – Chief Campbell and Sgt. Graham attended the fall Management Development Program Alumni Association fall conference in Blowing Rock. Some of the topics covered during the conference included: Community Policing Before the Crisis workshop, a presentation about Social Media and discussion of Giglio v. United States.

## GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

**Goal #1: To provide a uniform standard that will enable personnel of the department to be more consistent in procedures when handling situations.**

Daily briefings are being conducted by officers at shift changes. The Lieutenant and Sergeant have also discussed monthly schedule and operational concerns with all officers this month.

All officers completed policy reviews of General Order 007 – Prisoner Transports and General Order 008 – Emergency Response Driving and Pursuits.

**Goal #2: To provide for education and further development of department personnel to enhance officer and department professionalism.**

All officers viewed a training video of an officer involved shooting that occurred recently. In the video the officer was shot, but saved by his bulletproof vest, but the officer continued to remain in the game despite being injured.

Sgt. Graham attended the one-day course Legal Issues of Evidence Room at Randolph Community College on October 3<sup>rd</sup>.

Senior Officer Holt completed 6 continuing education online sessions on October 14<sup>th</sup>. These are required continuing education sessions that must be completed before renewing his Child Seat Technician certification next year.

Senior Officer Holt also completed two online courses through the NC Justice Academy: Opioid Awareness and Response and Leadership Through Community Partnership on October 14<sup>th</sup>.

Senior Officer McNeill completed 4 state mandated in-service training classes: 2018 Equality in Policing, 2018 Legal Update, 2018 Communication Skills with Persons in Crisis – De-Escalation Techniques, and Officer Safety: Surviving Planned Attacks Against Law Enforcement Officers on October 14<sup>th</sup>.

Senior Officer McNeill completed a continuing education online session (Car Seats 201) on October 14<sup>th</sup>. This is 1 of 6 required sessions before renewing his Child Seat Technician certification next year.

Officer Howard successfully completed her DCI General Inquiries recertification test on October 16<sup>th</sup> and is now recertified for two years.

Officer Strickland and Officer Hinson completed the week-long Officer Safety/Readiness Training that was held at the NC Justice Academy on October 19<sup>th</sup>.

Officer Howard completed the mandated in-service training 2018 Strategies to Improve Law Enforcement Interactions and Relationships with Minority Youth on October 4<sup>th</sup>, 2018 Equality in Policing on October 5<sup>th</sup>, 2018 Legal Update on October 9<sup>th</sup>, 2018 Officer Safety Surviving Planned Attacks Against Law Enforcement Officers on October 11<sup>th</sup>, and 2018 Communication Skills with Persons in Crisis – de-Escalation Techniques on October 27<sup>th</sup>.

Officer Strickland completed the mandated in-service training 2018 Equality in Policing on October 27<sup>th</sup>.

All sworn personnel completed the mandated in-service training Hazardous Materials and mandated in service Firearms training and qualification on October 22<sup>nd</sup>.

**Goal #3: Provide for a higher degree of personal contact between community and department personnel.**

Several officers worked during the Halloween Fest and concert on October 27th.

Officers welcomed 12 new residents this month and provided the new residents with a police “Welcome Packet” describing many of the services offered by our department.

Child IDs – There were no requests for Child IDs this month.

Chief Campbell, Sgt. Graham and Senior Officer Christian McNeill attended the monthly LEO meeting on October 25<sup>th</sup>.

Child seat installations – There were no requests for any child seat installations this month.

**Goal #4: Conduct special enforcement programs and participate in GHSP campaigns.**

Our department held a multi-agency checkpoint on October 5<sup>th</sup>. Two locations were set up and 3 departments assisted us with the checkpoint. Our department earned 100 points in the GHSP Step Reporting System for conducting this checkpoint.

**Goal #5: Continue current crime prevention programs to maintain the Village’s low crime statistics.**

We remain fully staffed.

There were no traffic complaints this month.

Officers have conducted:

- House checks – 499 (average 16 a day)
- Business checks – 1,005
- Store closings – 51
- Food Lion foot patrols - 59

We continue to have 10 seniors in the Senior Call In Program.

There were no requests for articles this month.

No traffic studies were conducted this month.

We have 5 certified child seat technicians. 4 officers and the Sergeant are certified child seat technicians.

**Goal #6: Proactive approach in looking for safety concerns.**

In our efforts to meet OSHA requirements, quarterly and yearly reviews of the Infectious Disease Control Plan have been scheduled. The next quarterly review will be scheduled for December.
